FLORIDA

HIGHLIGHTS

In Florida, Byrne JAG state funding has assisted with numerous innovative initiatives and supports:

- Approximately 54 task forces, multijurisdictional task forces, and 22 specialty and problem-solving courts.
- Pinellas County Jail Diversion Expansion, a
 1-year subgrant for assessments, treatment,
 and case management for the Pinellas
 County Mentally III Jail Diversion Program.
 The program provides ex-offenders who
 have mental health and/or co-occurring
 mental health and substance use disorders
 with treatment and case management
 assistance immediately upon their release
 from jail or prison.
- Dade County Intensive Day-Night Treatment Program, a substance abuse treatment center and transitional living facility. The program, through a 1-year subgrant, aims to address the unique needs of females who are arrested and charged with prostitution or are at high risk for prostitution-related offenses and have an identified substance abuse problem.
- Broward Addiction Recovery Center's Youth Force Program. Through a 1-year subgrant, this program serves at-risk youth ages 11 to 15 who exhibit risk factors for substance abuse, risky sexual behavior, criminal activity, or dropping out of school.


BJA INVESTMENTS

LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES AND OFFICERS



- More than 60% of the 345 law enforcement agencies in Florida have 50 or fewer sworn officers.
- Nearly 82% of sworn officers work for agencies with 100 or more officers.

OFFICER FATALITIES AND ASSAULTS

Between 2004 and 2013, 34 officers were feloniously killed (2 in 2013) and 34 officers were accidentally killed in the line of duty. In 2013, 6,056 officers were assaulted (12.15% of all officers assaulted in the United States).

CRIME TRENDS

According to the FBI Annual Report, nationwide violent crime in 2013 decreased more than 4% from the 2012 estimates. Below are the current crime trends for Florida:

In 2013, total arrests (904,135) decreased 5.83% from 2012. Violent-crime arrests decreased 2.51% (40,567), and property-related arrests decreased 2.06% (122,990).
